National Emphasis Programs (NEPs) are temporary programs that focus OSHA's resources on particular hazards and high-hazard industries.

Existing and potential new emphasis programs are evaluated using inspection data, injury and illness data, National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) reports, peer-reviewed literature, analysis of inspection findings, and other available information sources.

OSHA Inspection Process Under NEP

Inspections under the new NEP will begin after a 90-day outreach period; which is usually accomplished by a letter being sent out to all industries with North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) or Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) codes targeted by the emphasis program.

Outreach activities under this NEP will be continued quarterly thereafter and may include seminars, promotional materials, and the on-site consultation program.

SUBJECT: Revised Combustible Dust National Emphasis Program

ABSTRACT

- **Purpose:** This instruction contains policies and procedures for inspecting workplaces that generate or handle combustible dusts, and for determining whether such workplaces have addressed fire, flash fire, deflagration, and explosion hazards associated with combustible dusts. These dusts include, but are not limited to:
 - metal dust such as aluminum, magnesium and some forms of iron dusts
 - wood dust
 - coal and other carbon dusts, including carbon black
 - plastic dust, phenolic resins, and additives
 - rubber dust
 - biosolids
 - other organic dust, such as sugar, flour, paper, soap, and dried blood
 - certain textile materials
- **Scope:** This instruction applies OSHA-wide.
